







The Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention
Act (UFLPA), which went into effect
in June 2022, creates a rebuttable
presumption requiring importers to
provide "clear and convincing evidence
that the supply chain of the imported
product is free of forced labor." Since
then, CBP agents have detained more
than 1,800 apparel, footwear and
textiles shipments (valued at over \$87
million) at the border under suspicion
of being made with forced labor. Of
those, only 29% have been released.
